




The House of the Spirits by Isabel Allende




The Cemetery of Untold Stories by Julia Alvarez




Frida Kahlo: Beyond the Myth by Frida Kahlo & Diego Sileo






Mexikid: a graphic memoir by Pedro Martin





Esperanza Rising by Pam Munoz Ryan



Jovita Wore Pants: The Story of a Mexican Freedom Fighter



This tale of hope and solidarity features a compelling narrative and vibrant illustrations, bringing the life of this notable Latino American Civil Rights leader to vivid life.






Bye Land, Bye Sea (bilingual) by Rene Spencer & Rodolfo Montalvo
Two children lost at sea must overcome a language barrier if they
want to find a way home.

Fiestal: A Festival of Colors (bilingual) by Duncan Tonatiuh

A bilingual concept picture book celebrating colors through a street fiesta, showcasing green avocados, yellow tortillas, purple dance dresses, and brown charro pants, culminating in a double gatefold finale.





<u>Vlad, the Fabulous Vampire</u> by Flavia Drago

Vlad is a vampire burdened with the unfortunate trait of rosy cheeks that—oh no!—make him appear overly vibrant and disturbingly alive. He conceals his rosy hue beneath traditional black vampire attire, until he discovers that his best friend harbors a pink secret of her own.

<u>Spanish is the Language of My Family</u> (bilingual) by Michael Gerhart & John Parra

Manolo prepares for the school Spanish spelling bee with his abuela, practicing words like "hermoso," "orgulloso," and "fuerte."

As they practice, abuela shares her experiences of being punished for speaking Spanish in school, inspiring Manolo to study harder. This intergenerational story highlights family ties, cultural pride and healing.









<u>Isabel and Her Colores Go To School</u> (bilingual) by Alexandra Alessandri & Courtney Dawson

<u>Little Frida: a story of Frida Kahlo</u> by Anthony Brown

Following her battle with polio at six, Frida Kahlo experienced pain and loneliness but dreamed of flying. Her imagination introduced her to a girl in white who danced without pain and held her secrets, influencing Kahlo's future art. Inspired by Kahlo's diary, Anthony Browne vividly illustrates this journey, capturing the essence of her early fantasies in a style reminiscent of Kahlo's own. The book concludes with a brief biography of the artist, who continues to captivate art lovers globally.

An illustrated picture book autobiography in which award-winning author Yuyi Morales tells her own immigration story.















I AM NOT YOUR PERFECT MEXICAN DAUGHTER BY ERIKA SANCHEZ
