Director's Report – Clarence Public Library February 24, 2025

Financial

The financial statements are included in the board packets. Also included is the 2024 Final Payroll Report and the Contract Library "System Paid" Budget Analysis for the Clarence Public Library. The "System Paid" expense report shows specific expenses outline in Section 9 of the contract and the total expenses incurred during 2024. The analysis shows a bottom line surplus; therefore, our library does not owe anything towards the 2024 "System Paid" expense. The Final Payroll Report shows a shortfall of \$2,478.16. We are waiting to hear back from the Business Office as to whether this figure is accurate. (We had a \$14,544.95 surplus as of pp 20).

Tracy Palicki from the Business Office will soon complete the calculation of the 2024 Return to System and forward an invoice. This information will also be used to start calculations for the financial sections of the 2024 State Report, as well as the NYS Annual Financial Report (AFR) and IRS 990.

On December 19, 2024, the System Board of Trustees adopted the 2025 Budget for the Library System (Resolution 2024-27). Included are changes to our Library's 2025 budget which include: 2025 page wages increase to reflect the 12/31/24 NYS minimum wage \$.50 per hour increase to \$15.50 per hour; Corresponding increase in Senior Page wages to maintain \$1.00 per hour differential from Page rates; Contractually obligated increases in personnel costs per Collective Bargaining Agreements in force as of 1/1/25; Adjustments in general operating revenues and expenses.

Also, included in the 2025 Budget is an increase of \$1,000 in Misc. Program Expense per location. This additional funding had previously been available as "Year End Appeal Funding." In addition, included is an additional \$1,000 per location for Other Expenses. This funding is available for use by the Library to cover general operating expenses, such as supplies not provided by the System, Building and Equipment maintenance/repairs or additional programming expenses.

Grants-In-Aid

On January 16, 2025 the System Library Board passed Resolution 2025-1, approving an increase in the Clarence Public Library's Direct Revenue for \$20,000. This reflects funding awarded to the Clarence Public Library by NYS Assembly member Michael Norris. Use of these funds can be retained by the CPL and used for the purposes consistent with the sponsor's designation (library infrastructure).





While circulation and patron count were down slightly in January, there was still plenty of activity at the Clarence Public Library. We continued to offer our regular story times (Tale Craft and Read & Play) as well as Makery (afterschool craft) and Lego Club. Our monthly *Study in Sherlock* program deserves special mention because we had local author Lissa Marie Redmond join us for a thought-provoking discussion on 19th century author Anna Katharine Green and Arthur Conan Doyle. It was a fun program!

Other programs included *Chat About That*, a weekly program to help non-native English speakers with their English Conversation skills. We also offered Crochet Club, Knitting Club, and Tail Waggin'Tutors. On January 29, we celebrated Lunar New Year and Puzzle Day with a combined program. We had over 42 in attendance at the Lunar New program and 30 for Puzzle Day. This was followed on January 30 with a beautiful classical guitar concert by Nickel City Guitar Quartet with an attendance of 32. It should be noted that the Mindfulness/Meditation program was cancelled due to weather but rescheduled for March 11. This program has been so popular that we will be hosting it every month for the rest of the year!

Outreach: WinterFest

Sarah McLean Plunkett and Justin Carpenter represented the Clarence Library at Winter Fest and had over 100 people visit their table. Our next outreach event is March 8 at the International Day of Sharing where we will be representing the country of Ireland.

Building:

We had an issue with the damper in the meeting room being stuck in place. This issue caused it to be unreasonably cold in meeting room #2. This problem was repaired by Stark Technologies on 2/13. Currently, we also have an issue with one of the VAV fan units in the meeting room. Monica placed a work order with the Town to have it fixed.

Finally, the Town of Clarence has done an exceptional job salting and plowing and keeping our parking lot and sidewalks free of snow and ice during this exceptionally cold and snowy winter. Thank you to Jason Holden and his crew at the Parks Department for all their hard work this winter keeping the outside of the library safe for our patrons and staff.
